New Partnership with Living Waters for the World



Living Waters for the World (LWW), a ministry of the Synod of Living Waters, Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is bringing their hallmark training program, Clean Water U, to Johnsonburg June 23-27, 2020. This is an expansion from LWW's

base of training at Camp Hopewell in Oxford, MS. Living Waters for the World takes a unique approach to water ministry. The organization trains volunteers, mostly from Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) churches, to form international water partnerships. Teams engage directly with communities and train them to purify contaminated water, as well as help install and teach the local community to maintain the water purification systems.

"This is a wonderful opportunity coming at an important time," says Steve Young, LWW Executive Director. "LWW's mission teams have now partnered to install 1,000 water systems in communities throughout the world. By expanding our training into the northeast, we hope to welcome more churches into this life-changing work, as we look to the next 1,000 clean water partnerships."

"How exciting to be part of a global mission community via Clean Water U! Johnsonburg has trained leaders for the

national and international church for 60 years. Now, we are partnering with Living Waters, to educate new generations of people who feel called to make a difference. The Johnsonburg Board and staff look forward to welcoming clean water teams to the beautiful campus in northwest New Jersey," adds Elise Bates Russell, executive director of Johnsonburg.

"Camp Hopewell has been our training home since the beginning," says Kendall Cox, LWW's Director of Education. "Now we are expanding to Johnsonburg with Hopewell right alongside us to assist. What a gift God has given us by making us partners so that clean water may flow. We can't wait to see what grows from the seeds God has planted."

Since 1959, Johnsonburg has hosted summer camp, retreats, leadership development opportunities, and community-forming opportunities. Why The Cedars?

The size and longevity of the cedar tree symbolizes strength, and in Lebanon, the tree serves as an important cultural symbol for that reason. Poets and artists have conveyed the tree as a sign of strength and eternity, especially given the tree's endurance through tumultuous periods of history. Cedar trees have been present at Camp Johnsonburg since the beginning. The drooping boughs of the cedar tree, which often touch the ground and create a shelter around the tree, certainly suggest protectiveness, and some American Indians saw the red cedar as a symbol of protectiveness.

allusions to the cedar tree are made in the Bible, and one of the most meaningful occurs in the Book of Ezekiel, where the cedar's deep-reaching roots are said to be the cause of its grandeur: "Therefore [the] height was exalted above all the trees of the field, and [the] boughs were multiplied, and [the] branches became long because of the multitude of waters."

The ability of the cedar to tap deepflowing waters inaccessible to other trees and to, therefore, become "exalted above all the trees of the field" again alludes to the cedar tree as a symbol of wisdom.

Last year, the Johnsonburg Board approved a Forest Stewardship Plan for the care of the approximately 230 acres of forest (the other 70ish acres are the center of camp). As part of this plan, the camp will continue to aggressively remove and seek to eradicate invasive plants. (We don't want Autumn Olive or Multiflora Rose!) It

includes caring for the trees with appropriate trimming, and planning for an adequate number of trees in the forest. It also enables the camp to apply for state grants to continue this good work as faithful stewards of God's creation.

Reflection on Summer 2019


